


The contraction of *has* to 's is not pronounced as /IZ/ but usually as /az/ as in, e.g.: *The judge's* decided (/dʒa.dʒaz/)

The contraction of *is* to 's is pronounced as above and sounds uncontracted because /Iz/ is its normal full-form pronunciation.





There are a number of words in English which end with a voiced $/\delta$ / sound when they are verbs (usually with an -*e* ending) but end with the unvoiced $/\theta$ / if they are nouns. They include:

breathe /bri:ð/ vs. breath /breθ/ soothe /su:ð/ (verb only) loathe /ləʊð/ (verb only) bathe /beɪð/ vs. bath /ba:θ/ clothe /'kləʊð/ cloth /klɒθ/ mouth /maʊð/ vs. mouth /maʊθ/ seethe /si:ð/ (verb only) sheathe /ʃi:ð/ vs. sheath /ʃi:θ/ teethe /ti:ð/ vs teeth /ti:θ/ wreathe /ri:ð/ vs wreath /ri:θ/ writhe /raɪð/ verb only)

These words obey the rules when they take and *s* ending so, when used as verbs ending in δ , the ending is pronounced /z/ and when they are used as nouns ending in θ , the *s* inflexion is pronounced as /s/.
